Breakfast with St. Nick

There are so many special days during the year in which our council and Holy Spirit parish come together to provide a memorable and rewarding experience for parishioners and their relatives and guests. One such occasion is Children's Faith Formation's "Breakfast with St. Nicholas," which was held on Sunday, Dec. 10.

It's a time in which "all out" is the best way to describe the combination of preparation and execution performed by the parish staff, under the direction of Deborah Pearson, and the council, led by church activities director Jim Stavino. An estimated 400 guests were served a breakfast that featured scrambled eggs, pancakes, bacon, sausage, tortillas, hash brown casserole plus biscuits and gravy. With the request to either bring a new, unwrapped toy or make a financial contribution, more than \$960 was collected — topping last year's total by \$235 — along with about 350 toys. The donations will be presented to the [Better Tomorrows](#) shelters of Dallas County.

The Knights proved they can even go "two-deep" when it comes to providing the individual at the center of the event's activities. Our Leo Mattingly has long been the council's "go-to" St. Nick for years for obvious reasons. Leo was feeling under the weather going into the weekend, and Chris Edwards stepped forward to grab the mitre and patiently listen to each child's Christmas wishes. "Glad to do it," Chris said with a beaming smile from behind a beard that, while not yet in Leo's category, did the trick for each enchanted youngster.

KC math was again on display with a request that went out for "about 10" Knights, resulting in about twice that number reporting to help — many well before the requested starting time of 6:30 a.m. Joining Jim and Chris were Ernest Alvarez Jr., John Espree, Elvis Fajardo, (plus wife Thelma and daughters Ana-Isbel and Vanessa), Tony Gonzalez, Andy Goza, Gerald Jacob, Mario Mejia, Jeff Miller, Agustin Perez (plus wife Flora and daughter Joanna), Jesse Radillo, Jack Ramsden, Allen Reitmeier,

Jim Richardson, Jorge Ruiz, Jim Russell and James Smith.

Jim Russell's wife, Mary, again conducted an entertaining concert from her youth choir that included children of council members. Devin Buschow's youth ministry provided numerous elves that added to the youngsters' enjoyment.

All in all, it was another day to be proud to be a member of Council 8157 and of Holy Spirit parish.

"I'd like to say thank you to the tremendous outpouring of support from the KC's on this event," Deborah said afterward. "It's amazing to see so many men cooking in a kitchen ... lol. This event continues to grow every year and showcases what an outstanding parish community we have. I am truly honored to be a part of it."

He has quietly gone about his business as a KC member since joining the Order in May 2014 and as a parishioner since joining Holy Spirit in 1975. St. Joseph's Residence cookout – Fall 2017

Service to our Catholic community was on display on Saturday, Oct. 14, when more than a dozen Council 8157 members prepared and served what has become the annual fall luncheon to about 100 residents, relatives and staff members of the [St. Joseph's Residence home](#) in Oak Cliff that's operated by the Diocese of Dallas.

Richard Hohman, the home's assistant director, is a KC member living in Irving. He spoke on behalf of the Sisters who operate the home (and live there) and the almost 50 residents.

"It makes me proud to witness the Knights of Columbus Duncanville council continually bring joy and nourishment to the residents," Richard said. "Year after year, your group offers a fun-filled afternoon by providing a picnic feast for the residents, families and staff at St. Joseph's. It never ceases to amaze me the generosity and kindness the Knights bring not only to us but to many surrounding communities.

"The residents know these Knights and can't wait to see them again and again. The Duncanville council is so well organized and efficient, the food service goes on without a hitch. There is ample food, refreshments and desserts that even the hungriest residents get their fill."

On hand from our council were Grand Knight Jim Richardson, District Deputy Andy Goza, Al and Allen Alonzo, Larry Balagna, Billy Callender, Mike Fitzgerald, Tony Gonzalez, Jeff Miller and wife Frances, Jose Montoya, Efrain Ochoa, Jack Ramsden, Arthur Rodriguez, Frank Salazar, Art Senato and David Ybarra. Jorge Ruiz reported for duty at the parish community center on Saturday and, upon recognizing that the luncheon would be adequately staffed, volunteered elsewhere that day.

The home opened in 1955 and is the only Catholic senior assisted-living center in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. The diocese operates the home with the assistance of

the Sisters of the Bethlehemite Order, four of whom live at the home. Sister Carolina Sanchez Botero has been the home's director since 2007, having left her native Colombia for the United States in 1963.



"This isn't an institution; this is our home," Sister Carolina said. "We do not want a home that isn't a happy home." Our council has been providing a cookout around Mothers' Day for many years at the home and recently added the fall event to our

calendar. Billy, Efrain, Jack and Jose manned the grill out back to whip up dozens of hamburgers and hot dogs while the others set up the serving line and got the drinks and condiments in readiness. Mike prepared his signature baked beans and cookies at home. The luncheon was served after Father Ben Molina from St. Elizabeth of Hungary celebrated Mass in the home's chapel and then asked the blessing.

"From all the residents, families, staff and especially the Sisters, we cannot express our appreciation enough to the Duncanville council for everything you do," Richard added. "A huge thank you to these dedicated men and lady volunteers who give up their valuable time to bring a smile, laughter and a wonderful afternoon to the seniors at St. Joseph's Residence. This is truly a giving and sharing moment that is a testament of our faith and service to our Lord. God bless you guys."

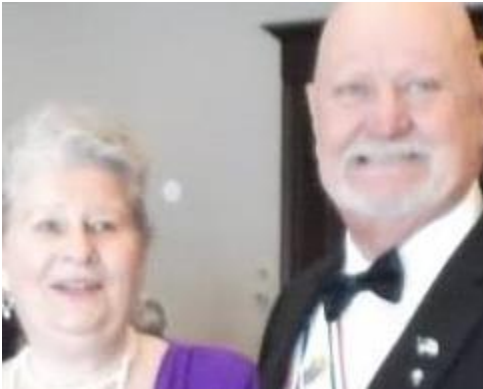
Dan is a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis and retired as a Navy Commander in 1995.

Knight Hands helps St. Vincent de Paul

On November 11th, 5 Knights of Council #8157 answered a call for help from the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. Larry Balagna, Mike Fitzgerald, Ray Rivera, Ken Rarick and I arrived at the home site located at 1014 Randlett St. in Lancaster Tx around 9:00am and removed the broken sections of fascia, soffit, drip edge and shingles and manufactured and installed new pieces right at the site.



The damage to the roof was caused by a fallen tree limb which destroyed about a 20' section of the roof. Larry and Mike were the main wreckers and installers

while I manufactured the pieces and Ray and Ken did all the clean-up and painting at the finish line. As in most of our Knight Hand projects there are hidden problems that are only discovered once the project begins. In the case of this project, a couple rafters had to be re-enforced and we did this work without electricity at the site. Mike also swept off all the debris on the roof caused by; well, we're not exactly sure. In the end all was repaired and painted with about 16 man/hrs. of labor and \$148.09 of material cost. Knight Hands has been operating in the Holy Spirit parish community and surrounding areas for 7 ½ years now and has completed 266 projects to date. Thanks to all who serve those in need.

Dan Murphy will be Director of Knight Hands in the absence of Allen Reitmeier beginning January 15th.

Fall baseball

The fall baseball season ended on October 21st this year. The final tournament (usually the "stamp out hunger tournament) which benefits the Cedar Hill Food Pantry, was cancelled because of lack of teams signing up for the event. Yet there were 163 games played during the fall season.



John Espree, Hector Rubio, Arthur Migala, Steve Castillo, Eric Conner, Tony Almanza, Mike Rumsey, were the heavy hitters for the fall season; but many other Knights contributed as well.. For the baseball committee (Allen Reitmeier, Andy Goza, Greg Warr, James Smith and Mike Rumsey) we thank each Knight that contributed their time and talent to make the fall season a success.



For the entire calendar year, the revenue generated from baseball concessions was far and away the most in the 10 years of operation. 750 little league games were played in Cedar Hill during calendar year 2017, and the Knights of Columbus were there for every one of them. Most of the games were played at Valley Ridge Park; but there was also a number of tournament games played at Dot Thomas. Again thanks to all the Knights who contributed to make this a fantastic year.

The regular 2018 BSB (Best Southwest Baseball) season begins on March 24th with picture day and pitch hit and run on the 25th of March. The Southwest Classic season begin during the week of the 19th of March. This year's World Series event will be played from June 20th through June 24th.

The baseball committee will remain in place for the upcoming season with the exception of Allen Reitmeier who is temporarily moving to Minnesota. Please be as cooperative with the new Director of Baseball as you have been the past 10 years.

Football Summary

This is the second year that the Knights of Columbus participated in operating the concession stand at the football field at Valley Ridge Park in Cedar Hill. The season began in July (imagine that) with adult flag football games. These flag football games became a major contributor to the success of the concession stand. James Smith estimated that the Knights participated in about 48 flag football games during the summer and fall of 2017. Most of the work manning the concession stand came from James Smith, Jim Stavinoha, Peter Perta, Jim Richardson

and Andy Goza. Others helped as well including Jim Russell, Tony Gonzalez, Bill and Cindy Dover, Mario Ramos, Susan and Madison Goza, and Judy Smith. While the flag football season was ongoing (both Saturdays and Sundays), Cedar Hill little league football games were also played. Again James Smith estimated that 12 such games were played during the season. Pretty much the same Knights and helpers manned the concession stand for these games. About 60 football games were played during the summer and fall at Valley Ridge – considerably less than had been originally estimated.

Most of the organizing and preparing and operating the concession was done by committee; consisting of Jim Richardson, Jim Stavinoha, Andy Goza, and James Smith.
