# Knight Hands Project #332 and #333

Knight Hands continues its community work by completing two fairly difficult projects this past month. On November 14th, 2019, David Dybala, Steve Zehnder, Ken Rarick, Hector Rubio, Mike Fitzgerald, Dan Murphy and I completed a project at the home of Cora Mancenido located in DeSoto Tx. The main objective of this project was to eliminate 1/4" to 3/8" gaps in Cora's wooden flooring in several rooms and the hall. David Dybala (ever an engineer) discovered by heating the delinquent pieces they could be forced back together; so that's what he and Ken Rarick and Steve Zehnder did. The significance of this work was that it saved Cora about \$20,000.00 - the amount she had been quoted by a contractor to replace the flooring. While that was going on the rest of us replaced the rotted wood on the rear steps leading to the swimming pool; plus building and installing a hand rail on those same steps. We completed all these tasks in about 28 man/hrs. Cora was most pleased.





On December 14th, Efrain Ochoa, John Espree, Larry Balagna, Jorge Ruiz, Hector Rubio, David Ybarra and I replaced the rotten siding on Hector Rubios' home in Duncanville. We started at 9am. We tore off the old rotted siding and discovered that the bottom sill plate on the home had also rotted. After much maneuvering the guys replaced the bottom sill plate, re-enforced the floor joists, replaced torn and damaged tar paper and then installed new siding.



While this was going on, three of us installed a new personal door on the garage. That sounds like no big deal except the opening for the door was concrete which required us to drill into the concrete to secure the wood on both sides of the opening. Again after much maneuvering we got the door to fit just right - including a trip back to my garage to plane a 2" x 8" plank down to 1-3/16". Just another walk in the park for John and Efrain



After installing the window trim and corner trim and transition trim, the job was done. Hector said he would paint the whole thing at a later date. So in about 31 man/hrs. we completed this job to Hector's delight. These two projects were # 332 and #333 since the inception of Knight Hands.

## **Knights and Special Olympics**

Would Special Olympics exist without the Knights of Columbus? Maybe yes, maybe no – you be the judge. The Knights have been one of the initial founding members of Special Olympics, and it has grown and evolved with and because of the Knights. In June 1963, Eunice Kennedy Shriver, sister of John F. Kennedy and wife of Sargent Shriver (both men were Knights) held a camp for young people with disabilities in her backyard.



She recognized how special they were and the limited opportunities for them to participate in athletic events. The first summer Special Olympic games were held, with the help of the Knights, in Soldier Field on July 20th 1968 for about 1000 athletes. Since June of 1962 the Knights of Columbus have given in excess of \$167 million to Special Olympics and 70 million volunteer hours with the athletes; encouraging them, congratulating them, supporting them, and awarding them with the medals and ribbons them won at various competitions. Knights of Columbus in the past and the present lead the way in donating money and personal volunteer hours to the success of Special Olympics and the Olympians. The love and satisfaction gained be being involved with the athletes cannot be explained. Ask someone who has been involved. Would Special Olympics exist us?

During the recent Special Olympic bowling event, approximately 3,500 athletes with various physical and mental disabilities bowled two games in pursuit of a medal or a ribbon. Many were in wheelchairs,

some were blind, many were mentally challenges and all had some disability. The spirit of these athletes was uplifting. They were happy and delighted to be active in a sporting event. And their teachers and parents were so elated to be a part of Special Olympics. And these 3,500 athletes did indeed receive a medal or a ribbon presented to them by the Knights of Columbus. The bowling event was held at two bowling center each with 58 lanes and the competition was held for a period of 8 days. What an extravaganza!!!
