Farewell To Father Joe

We bid farewell to Father Joseph Lee on Saturday June 27th, 2020 as he departed from our parish after 11 years as our spiritual leader and priest of Holy Spirit Catholic Church.



Father Joe presided over mass at 8:30 AM and afterwards was escorted by the Knights of Columbus "Color Corps" to a stage under the bell tower where he would address the congregation parked in their cars in the east parking lot.

Before Father Joe's emotion filled final address, the crowd heard from other speakers including Father Eugene Okoli, Deacon Paul Wood, RCIA Director Lindee Greer, and BK Steve Zehnder.

Lindee Greer presented Father Joe a framed photo of himself taken during the final moments of the installation of the new corpus in the sanctuary, which Father Joe was instrumental in making a reality.

Finally came a parade of over 150 cars honking their horns and bearing signs of love, good wishes and gratitude for Father Joe's devotion to our community. Parishioners had waited patiently in line in their cars for over an hour to drive in the parade past the tent in front of the community center building to bid their last farewell to Fr. Joe.

Our thanks to all the knights for participating in Father Joe's Farewell event on Saturday and over the last few days. It was a lot of work but we got it all set up, and torn down and put away by noon on Saturday.

A message from the Grand Knight



**Brother
Knights,**

The year 2020 will be an unforgettable year, we're barely halfway through it and so much that has transpired has had worldwide impact. The new year got off to a rocky

start as the political battle that had been brewing in Washington DC for years spilled into January. Then we heard rumblings of a killer virus outbreak in the distant city of Wuhan, China; which most of us probably ignored since the stories were not quite front-page news yet at the time. But then came the infections, the illness and even death.

Fast forward to mid-July, and I'm not sure if it feels like time has flown by, or is it standing still? A new reality appears to be taking shape. The fear of infections has prompted quarantines, lockdowns, social distancing and the wearing of masks, indoors and out; and many fear the "old normal" may not return.

Throughout this pandemic, many knights from our council sought ways to help out where we were needed most, in the community providing meals for our first responders, and helping those in need of home repairs, food or funds due to loss of work. Our council enters its 39th fraternal year as I take the gavel in my new role of Grand Knight. We may be in uncharted territory running a council during a pandemic, but we're not alone and I believe I have the technical expertise to keep us meeting, communicating and functioning as a virtual council, at the very least. We have a solid electronic communication system in place, an amazing website, a great newsletter, and when combined with timely email campaigns we can keep our membership informed and mobilize it when needed. There's no doubt we may face other challenges as a council

during the next 12 months, but I believe we have a great team in place to help us meet any challenge.

During the next few months I plan to examine how our council's current service programs align with the supreme council's **Faith in Action** program model. I would like to see us develop new programs that will also serve to attract new members.

Some of my plans include:

- Develop and maintain a strong relationship with our priests and our parish.
- Assist the church with pandemic reopening activities.

- Closely manage budget expenditures, as we have lost revenue this year without baseball concessions work.

Knights Engaging 3.0

“Some of them said WOW,” was part of the text that Dudley Wilcoxson, EMS liaison at Methodist Charlton Hospital, sent to our Dan Murphy, director of community activities, following the third 8157 meal delivery to the hospital staff in as many weeks on Thursday, April 23. This time, the council prepared about 150 cookout lunches that featured a hamburger, hot dog, bag of chips and Mike Fitzgerald’s signature ginger snaps for a host of Charlton personnel: emergency department staff, respiratory techs, radiology staffers, environmental services staff, plant operations technicians and education department staff.



Dan Murphy and James Smith, our director of church activities, again spearheaded the effort with Jack Ramsden arriving early to set up the grilling area behind Holy Spirit’s community center. They were joined by Efrain Ochoa, David Ybarra and Jeff Miller with Arthur Rodriguez pitching in following Father Eugene’s virtual Mass in the dining room. Mr. Wilcoxson was helped make the pickup by Kim Uebner, the hospital’s education coordinator, and Suzanne Hunt, a nurse in the emergency department. This followed a fish fry two weeks earlier and a delivery of breakfast tacos a week earlier.

Wilcoxson’s text also included:

“Thx for everything y’all hv done for us. It is greatly appreciated. The staffs eye got big when (you) showed up.”



Keeping the Tradition

It has long been a tradition that the Knight of Columbus of this Council cook a meal for the staff, residents and their family or visitors on Mothers’ Day at the St Joseph’s Assisted Living Center in Oak Cliff. With the current pandemic running its’ course, no outsider is allowed to enter the St, Joseph’s assisted living center. They are quite pleased to say they have not had one single case of COVID-19 thus far and they aim to keep it that way.



Once the hamburgers and hot dogs were finished and the fixings were assembled and everything cleaned up and put away for use later all was loaded onto Dan’s truck. Dan and David then took the meal to St. Joseph’s and dropped the meals onto the loading dock where it was retrieved by the staff at St. Joseph’s. Normally we serve the meal to the resident and have lively conversations – the coronavirus prevented us from doing that; but our effort did show the residents we were thinking about them and honoring the many Mothers in residence. We cooked for about 80 staff and residents. Thanks to all who helped keep the tradition alive.

This past March marked the 40th anniversary of Steve's entry into the Knights of Columbus. That took place in Council 4118 in his native Kansas. Steve was

convinced to join the KC's by those around him at Bishop Carroll High in Wichita, where he was a math teacher. Steve graduated from what's now Emporia State University in December 1974, weeks after he and Linda were married over Thanksgiving weekend. The Reids came to north Texas (and specifically Duncanville) in the final days of 1985 just before Steve, who'd left teaching to do aerospace analysis, was hired by LTV in Grand Prairie. The Reids have three grown sons – for years we saw Steve in his Boy Scout troop leader uniform – three granddaughters and two grandsons. With retirement last September, Steve has more time for service; we saw him happily greeting diners on the serving line for the Lenten fish fries and he has helped since January at Holy Spirit's food pantry twice a week. He notes that demand at the latter has nearly doubled during the current pandemic. Beginning in July, Steve will be our Outside Guard.

Showing Support for Duncanville Police

This week the Knights of Council 8157 demonstrated our support for the men and women who work at the Duncanville Police Department with a small token of appreciation, we served them lunch and dinner over two consecutive days. After making our offer known to Officer Doug Sisk, a Crime Prevention Specialist for the Duncanville PD, he happily accepted on behalf of the department and we worked out the date of Tuesday-Wednesday, June 23-24 as the most convenient for all.



In order for us to serve a meal to all the members of the Duncanville Police Department while they are on duty in different shifts and rotations, we had to serve lunch for some of the staff at midday and then serve dinner later that evening for other staff members on Tuesday; and then repeat the process the following day.



We made four deliveries and a total of 90 individually packed meals consisting of a hamburger; a hot dog; a bag of chips; a bag of cookies; a bag with fresh lettuce, tomatoes, onions and pickles; and all the condiments and napkins. A few cases of bottled water were also donated. On the second, day Officer Sisk reported our meals had been very well received by the staff of the DPD.

Making all this happen were some of our A-Team brother knights: James Smith, Dan Murphy, Jack Ramsden, Efrain Ochoa, David Ybarra, Arthur Rodriguez and Jorge Ruiz. Thank you brother knights, it was the least we could do to show support for the men and women who put their lives on the line every day to keep our community safe from crime. Thank you Duncanville Police.



“Sprucing Up”

In order to give our new incoming Parochial Vicar a proper welcome, Leonardo Zapata, asked Knight Hands to “spruce up” the living quarters for Fr. Esteban Antes who will be arriving sometime during the last week of June, 2020. More specifically, Leonardo asked us to repair all the drywall cracks, repair the water damaged areas, replace the bath exhaust fan and then paint the bedroom and sitting room where Fr. Esteban will reside.

So on Thursday June 18, 2020 Steve Zehnder, Dan Murphy, Mike Fitzgerald, Jorge Ruiz and I arrived at the Rectory and began the process of preparing the two room for painting.

Steve Zehnder took charge due to his professional experience with these type of projects.



He proclaimed early on that the biggest job would be preparing the rooms for painting, rather than the actual painting. And he was right. First of all the furnishings had to move out of the rooms or covered with plastic. Then Steve and Dan repaired the drywall cracks – there were about 11 such cracks which had to be re-taped and mudded and then textured. While this was going on the rest of us covered the floor with plastic, taped off all the cabinets and floor molding, removed all the electrical covers, took down the drapery and blinds, removed pictures and hardware, and covered the ceiling fans with plastic. By the time this was complete it was time to call it a day – besides the drywalls repairs had to dry before painting.



On Friday morning, June 19th, 2020 Dan Murphy, Jack Ramsden, Steve Zehnder, David Ybarra and I arrived at 8am to finish the job. Painting went quite quickly with Jack painting the bathroom, David painting the closet and Steve, Dan, and I painting and cutting in the ceiling and

walls. Then everything had to be put back the way it was when we began which took a couple more hours. After a final clean, we proclaimed the project complete. In all Knights worked about 40 hours to complete this job with about \$220.00 in material expense. It is now ready for the arrival of Fr. Steve. Thanks men for a job well done.

For this reason we decided to offer our council's annual donation to Holy Spirit Church in July, at the very start of our new fraternal year, rather than wait until January as had been customary in years past.
