Castle Building by Knight Hands



The finished product looks like a castle but in fact it is a playground set for youngsters. Knight Hands got involved when Rachel Cromwell-Reetz (Holy Spirit Youth Ministry Coordinator) contacted David Dybala (Director of Knight Hands) asking if Knight Hands could assemble the playground for her grandkids whose parents are Tiffany and Patrick Bryant. David said “sure”, and so on Thursday morning February 9, 2023, David Dybala, Dan Murphy, Allen Reitmeier, David Ybarra, Jesse Radillo, Jose Montoya, and Larry Balagna arrived at 6108 Hedgeapple Court in Arlington to tackle this project. At first blush this job appears relatively simple. But in reality it was extremely complicated. First off there were 491 pieces of lumber that had to be assembled in the proper order. There were numerous bags of bolts, nuts and screws of various sizes and lengths that had to be used in the proper

location as well. There were 48 pages of instructions on how to do this bad boy – Whew!!



After leveling a spot in the back yard, Jose Montoya and Dan Murphy, David Ybarra and Jesse Radillo started with the platform construction while David Dybala, Allen Reitmeier, and Larry Balagna started assembling the round turret.



As time went on we developed into a rhythm where Jose Montoya would study the drawing, announce the pieces to use and the required fasteners, and the rest of us would then locate them and install those pieces in the proper order and place. This was complicated by the fact that these 491 wood pieces were randomly packed in 5 large boxes – so each piece had to be searched out and identified by very difficult markings. Slowly and steadily as the day wore on, the playground set came into shape and by the end of day #1, the basic components had been installed. Those components were the playground platform, the ladder,

the various decks, the turret, the slide, and the rock climbing wall. We started at 8:30am and knocked off work about 5:30pm – so a pretty full day. We snacked on pigs-in-blanket and bearclaw pastry along with water, soft drinks, and Gatorade. Coffee was provided by Tiffany. We – David Dybala, Larry Balagna, Dan Murphy, Allen Reitmeier, and Jesse Radillo – completed the work on Friday February 10th. Again we started about 8:30am and the days’ work consisted mainly of installing the various roofs on the playground, as well as assembling a miniature picnic table. This day Dan Murphy determined which piece went where and the rest of us installed them.

There were also many final details that had to be completed before we could say the job was done. By 12:30pm the job was complete. In total Knight Hands contributed approximately 80 man hours of volunteer hours. If you have ever assembled a piece of IKEA furniture; this was just like it times a thousand. Thanks men – you did well.



Have you heard about environmental walls?

Me neither. So it was an interesting request by Kristine Kurrasch – Holy Spirit’s Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministry when she asked Knight Hands to build 5 of the walls. These walls will be used as background when Kristine is teaching classes. She also wanted these “on the cheap” and, in fact suggested we use discarded pallet wood. She also asked that they be on wheels so that they could be easily moved around from place to place.



Knight Hands seldom walk away from a challenge; so we proceeded to procure wood from discarded fencing in the neighborhood. Dan Murphy and Allen Reitmeier disassembled these fence sections and after much sawing and resurfacing, this discarded fencing turned into what you see above. The mill work and construction was done in the workshop (garage) of Allen Reitmeier with the majority of the work done by Allen; but was assisted on two afternoon by Jose Montoya. Kristine and the church seemed quite pleased with the final product, particularly the cost of each wall (about \$32). The only thing Knight Hands purchased were the casters, a box of lag screws and a couple 2 x 4’s. Knight Hands’ contribution to this project was approximately 34 hours of labor – time well spent.

Fred Ciarochi – 2022

Our Brother Fred Ciarochi, M.D. was born and raised in Uniontown, in the coal country of western

Pennsylvania. After graduating from St John Roman Catholic high school, he attended St. Vincent College and then on to the University of Pittsburgh Medical School and service at Mercy Hospital in Pittsburgh. After his first year at St. Vincent's he met Sandi, a young lady who was attending Seaton Hill College. Their first date was on her birthday.

Doctor Fred trained as an Internal Medicine Resident at what is now the UPMC Mercy hospital and did his post-doctoral fellowship at Pitt (UPMC Presbyterian). He volunteered for the US Navy and served as a Lieutenant Commander at the US Naval Hospital in Corpus Christi, Texas.

The growing Ciarochi family so enjoyed their tour in Corpus Christi that when Dr. Fred learned that Methodist Hospital in Dallas was opening a second hospital and a diabetes unit they moved, setting up a new home in Duncanville, arriving on July 4, 1976. His previous pastor knew that Fr. Robert Sykora was starting a new catholic church in Duncanville and on their first Sunday they set out to find it. They had an address but there was no church building at 1111 Daniieldale Road. Instead, they discovered a group of people gathered under some trees east of what is now the church parking lot. It was the first mass on the church property.

He and Sandi have three children. All three are graduates of Duncanville High School and were active in Holy Spirit programs and activities. Brother Fred's Knights career started at an early age. While in high school he joined Colombian Squires Council 1275 in Union City, PA. Membership in the adult Knights had to take a back seat to his career in medicine but he had the examples of his father and father in law who were both 4th degree knights. Retirement and a desire to contribute more to the parish and to the community led Brother Fred to join our council.
